- 24 June Laid the¹ cornerstone of the new Capitol today. We heard the cannon.
- 27 June Ruth is in^h the shed working on peacock feathers dusters this week.
- 1 July Eldresses Ann and Polly have made each sister a lace cap, starched and ironed "and drew them up and put them all on..." Also made them for 2d Family.

- 7 July A young couple came from Cohoes to see if they could sell us some worsted webbing for seating chairs.
